Pittsburgh Symposium Addresses Dating Violence Prevention

- PCADV, PA Says NO MORE, Southwest PA Says NO MORE, FISA Foundation Host Youth-Focused Two-Part Symposium -

PITTSBURGH – November 2, 2015 – Pennsylvania Coalition Against Domestic Violence (PCADV), PA Says NO MORE, Southwest PA Says NO MORE and FISA Foundation will host a two-part symposium in Pittsburgh on ending domestic violence and sexual assault. Both sessions focus on the important role of engaging young people to create a generation of change committed to ending dating violence, the first session for adults and a separate session for high school and college students. The programs are free but registration is required.

"Teens are particularly vulnerable to dating violence," said PCADV Prevention Manager Kristen Herman. "One in three teens will experience abuse in a dating relationship and more than two-thirds of them will never report it to anyone. The symposium will equip local youth and professionals to take action and make the prevention of dating violence a greater possibility than ever."

PART ONE: Professionals working with youth are encouraged to attend *Engaging Youth: Working Across Generations to Prevent Dating Violence* on Wednesday, Nov. 18 at The Circuit Center, 5 Hot Metal Street, in Pittsburgh's South Side. This session runs from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and addresses the importance of discussing dating violence prevention, gender messaging and roles in perpetuating gender violence, and strategies for working with and maintaining conversations with youth. Speakers include:

- Elizabeth Miller, M.D., Ph.D., University of Pittsburgh Medical Center. Dr. Miller is the
 chief of <u>Children's Hospital of UPMC's Division of Adolescent and Young Adult Medicine</u>.
 Her current research focuses on the impact of gender-based violence on young
 women's reproductive health.
- Ben Atherton-Zeman, <u>Voices of Men</u>. Atherton-Zeman is a spokesperson for the
 <u>National Organization for Men Against Sexism</u> and a public speaker on issues of violence
 prevention. He has performed and presented in 44 states and many countries and has
 worked as a prevention educator for rape crisis centers, domestic violence programs
 and state coalitions for 17 years.
- **Daryl Fort**, Mentors in Violence Prevention. Fort is a senior strategies trainer and curriculum developer for the gender violence education and prevention program

developed by Dr. Jackson Katz. He has spent 15 years training thousands of athletes, coaches, administrators and students to put an end to dating and sexual violence.

PART TWO: High school and college students are encouraged to attend *Ending Dating Violence: How to be the Generation of Change* on Thursday, Nov. 19 from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the Jewish Community Center in Squirrel Hill. Daryl Fort will lead an interactive discussion of how dating and sexual violence affects teens, prevention strategies for everyday life, and ideas for turning beliefs into action.
